For applications submitted through Grants.gov, a date and time receipt indication will be the basis of determining timeliness. The proposal must be validated by Grants.gov in order to be considered timely. PLEASE NOTE: It may take Grants.gov up to two (2) business days to validate or reject the application. Please keep this in mind in developing your submission timeline.

Funding Opportunity Description: NOAA announces the availability of Federal funding,

authorized pursuant to 16 U.S.C. 3645(d)(2) and Public Law 112-55 (Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2012), for necessary expenses associated with the restoration of Pacific salmon populations. The Pacific Coastal Salmon Recovery Fund (PCSRF) program makes such funding available to the States of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, California, and Alaska, and federally recognized tribes of the Columbia River and Pacific Coast (including Alaska) for projects necessary for conservation of salmon and steelhead populations that are listed as threatened or endangered, or identified by a State as at-risk to be so-listed, for maintaining populations necessary for exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing, or for conservation of Pacific coastal salmon and steelhead habitat. This announcement outlines the priorities and guidelines that will be used to distribute funding to eligible entities.

FULL ANNOUNCEMENT TEXT

I. Funding Opportunity Description

A. Program Objective

The PCSRF was established in Fiscal Year (FY) 2000 to address a coast-wide need to protect, restore and conserve Pacific Chinook, coho, chum, sockeye and pink salmon and steelhead, and their habitat. The PCSRF supplements existing state and tribal programs to foster development of federal-state-tribal-local partnerships in salmon recovery and conservation by providing grants for restoration of anadromous salmonids to the eligible states and tribes.

Under this solicitation, NMFS seeks applications for projects from eligible States, Indian tribes, representative Tribal Commissions, and Alaska Native Tribal Consortiums (Consortiums) so that it can allocate the FY 2012 Federal funds for PCSRF grants based on scientific and merit principles. An applicant can only submit one application to the Federal government for PCSRF program funding. Applications from both the representative Tribal Commission or Consortium and a Tribe represented by that Commission or Consortium will not be accepted. In the event that applications are submitted by both a representative Tribal Commission or Consortium and a Tribe, the NMFS will contact both parties for resolution.

B. Program Priorities

The PCSRF is to supplement State and tribal programs for salmon restoration by allocating federal funding to projects and activities that provide demonstrable and measurable benefits to Pacific anadromous salmonids (Chinook, coho, chum, sockeye, and pink salmon and steelhead) and their habitat. In accordance with the Congressional authorization, these projects and activities are those "necessary for conservation of salmon and steelhead populations that are listed as threatened or endangered, or identified by a State as at-risk to be so-listed, for maintaining populations necessary for exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing, or for conservation of Pacific coastal salmon and steelhead habitat." [Public Law 112-55]

Priorities for FY 2012 PCSRF applications, in ranked order, are:

- (1) Projects that address factors limiting the productivity of ESA-listed

Pacific salmonids as specified in approved, interim or proposed Recovery Plans. This includes projects that are a necessary precursor to implementing priority habitat actions for ESA-listed salmonids (e.g., project planning/design).

(2) Projects that restore or protect the habitat of anadromous salmonids that are at-risk of being ESA listed or are necessary for exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing. This includes projects that are a necessary precursor to implementing habitat actions (e.g., project planning/design).

(3) Effectiveness monitoring of habitat restoration actions at the watershed or larger scales for ESA-listed anadromous salmonids, status monitoring projects that directly contribute to population viability assessments for ESA-listed anadromous salmonids, or monitoring necessary for the exercise of tribal treaty fish rights or native subsistence fishing on anadromous salmonids.

(4) Other projects consistent with the Congressional authorization with demonstrated need for PCSRF funding. This includes habitat restoration and planning projects not included in the above priorities, as well as outreach, coordination, research, monitoring, and assessment projects that can be justified as directly supporting one of the priorities.

Grant applications may be submitted for one or more of the priorities. However, a separate proposal narrative and budget must be included in the application for each priority. Grant applications will be evaluated separately for each priority. NOAA anticipates a greater proportion of the available FY 2012 PCSRF funding will be distributed to the higher-ranked priorities. States, Tribal Commissions and Consortia must have at least 10% of their application apply to monitoring.

C. Program Authority

16 U.S.C. 3645(d)(2); Consolidated and Further Continuing Appropriations Act, 2012, Public Law 112-55 (November 18, 2011).

II. Award Information

A. Funding Availability

Up to \$65,000,000 may be available for FY 2012 projects. Depending on the number of applications and amount of funding requested for each priority, NOAA may limit or proportion the distribution of FY 2012 PCSRF funds to each PCSRF

priority. There are no restrictions on minimum funding requests, but there is a limit of \$30,000,000 as the maximum amount requested by any applicant. Award periods may be extended to a maximum of five years. Start dates on proposals should be no earlier than July 1, 2012.

B. Project/Award Period

The PCSRF program announcement is for programs and projects to be conducted for a 1-year or up to 5-year period, with an anticipated start date no earlier than July 1, 2012.

C. Type of Funding Instrument

The funding instrument will be a grant.

III. Eligibility Information

A. Eligible Applicants

Eligible applicants are the States of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, California, and Alaska, and federally-recognized tribes of the Columbia River and Pacific Coast (including Alaska).

B. Cost Sharing or Matching Requirement

State applicants are required to match or document in-kind contributions of at least 33% of received Federal funds. Indian tribes, representative tribal commissions and consortiums are exempt from any cost share requirement. Matching funds consist of PCSRF projects funded totally or partially by state appropriated funds; PCSRF projects that are funded totally or partially by sub-recipient or contractor funds; or PCSRF projects funded partially by other pre-approved sources of federal funding. In-kind contributions must be applied directly to a PCSRF project in order to be considered match. State funding for a PCSRF program administration project may be used as matching funds.

C. Other Criteria that Affect Eligibility

1. Eligible States will submit applications through one designated State entity identified by a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with NMFS. Applications from multiple State agencies within one state will not be accepted.

2. Indian Tribes must demonstrate eligibility in their application for consideration. They may act on their own behalf when applying for PCSRF funding or may allow their representative Tribal Commission or Consortium to act for them through an MOU agreement with NMFS. Applications requesting funding from both the representative Tribal Commission or Consortium and a Tribe represented by that

Commission or Consortium will not be accepted. In the event that applications are submitted by both a representative Tribal Commission or Consortium and a Tribe, NMFS will contact both parties for resolution.

4. Program or Project Narrative (30 Page Limit): Descriptive document on how the applicant intends to carry out the proposed program or project(s).

a. Program application narratives for States, Tribal Commissions, and Consortia. Narratives must describe program administration and separately describe proposed funding for each of the four PCSRF priorities for which funding is proposed as follows.

1. Program Administration. The program narrative must include the following details:

a. A detailed description of the organization's administrative resources, credibility, financial stability, business management systems, and capability to comply with federal grant requirements. The narrative should include a description of past performance in the management of federal funds, previous experience implementing salmonid restoration programs, and knowledge of and demonstrated performance in implementing federal cost principles compliance and sub-recipient fiscal monitoring (if applicable).

b. Description of existing anadromous salmonid restoration programs and how the proposed PCSRF funds will supplement those programs. This includes documentation that the applicant's organization has existing salmonid programs and the appropriate management authority to implement actions identified in the

proposal.

c. A description of the anticipated benefits and outcomes of the program or project(s) for anadromous salmonids and how the applicant will administer and manage the program or project(s) to ensure that demonstrable and measurable benefits and outcomes are achieved.

d. Description of the applicant's competitive and non-competitive project solicitation processes, timelines, project selection criteria, technical reviews of proposed project merit and feasibility, , funding decisions, and how these elements will be managed and administered to ensure that funds are effectively and efficiently applied to the PCSRF priorities.

e. Description of the amount of funds proposed for projects to be funded under each process (competitive verses non-competitive), a description of types of projects to be funded through each process, and how determinations are made on which process is used. This should include how the processes will be used to ensure at least ten percent (10%) of the proposed funding is for monitoring.

f. Description of program implementation monitoring and how the applicant ensures projects and activities deliver the measurable benefits to anadromous salmonids as proposed. Description of the proposed methods for monitoring program implementation and evaluating program effectiveness.

g. Description of applicant's project tracking and reporting system and how it will be used to ensure PCSRF reporting requirements are fully met. For prior PCSRF grant recipients, this should include a description of how the applicant has adhered to PCSRF reporting requirements including timely and complete entry of project information into the PCSRF database, and how they resolved database reporting issues, inconsistencies or missing metrics, if applicable.

h. Description of major accomplishments in fulfilling PCSRF authorized activities and program priorities, using past PCSRF funds (if applicable), including history of project funding, types of projects, and outcomes. This may include reference to reports that the applicant has completed on their past accomplishments.

2. Program Proposal by PCSRF Priority. A separate narrative and budget should be provided for each priority area that the proposed program intends to address. The applicant must describe the following under each priority:

a. Proposed amount of funding (including matching funds) for projects to address a given priority.

b. Description of the proposed program's activities that will specifically address a given priority, including the rationale, justification, expected measurable outcomes, and benefits to the species of the proposed program and projects. The description should be supported quantitatively when possible (e.g., number/types of limiting factors by Recovery Plan, estimated miles/acres of habitat proposed for restoration, number/types of treaty/subsistence fisheries, number/names of watersheds/populations to be monitored, etc.).

c. Description of project solicitation and selection criteria and processes that will be used to ensure that projects selected for funding under the proposed program will effectively address the intended PCSRF priority

d. Description of the geographic area(s) of focus for activities under the proposed program including the rationale for why projects in one area may be selected over other areas.

b. Project application narratives for individual tribes. Narratives must describe program administration and separately describe proposed projects under the applicable PCSRF priority.

1. Tribal Project Administration. The narrative must include the following details:

a. A detailed description of the tribe's administrative resources, credibility, financial stability, business management systems, and capability to comply with federal grant requirements. The narrative should include a description of past performance in the management of federal funds, previous experience implementing salmonid restoration programs, and demonstrated performance in

implementing federal cost principles compliance and sub-recipient fiscal monitoring (if applicable).

b. Description of the tribe's existing anadromous salmonid restoration program(s) and how the proposed PCSRF funds will supplement those programs. This includes documentation that the tribe has existing salmonid programs and the appropriate management authority to implement actions identified in the proposal.

c. A description of the anticipated benefits and outcomes of the tribe's proposed project(s) for anadromous salmonids and how the tribe will administer and manage the project(s) to ensure that demonstrable and measurable benefits and outcomes are achieved.

d. Description of project implementation monitoring and how the applicant ensures projects deliver the measurable benefits to anadromous salmonids as proposed. Description of the proposed methods for monitoring project implementation and evaluating project effectiveness.

e. Description of applicant's project tracking and reporting system and how it will be used to ensure PCSRF reporting requirements are fully met. For prior PCSRF grant recipients, this should include a description of how the applicant has adhered to PCSRF reporting requirements including timely and complete entry of project information into the PCSRF database, and how they resolved database reporting issues, inconsistencies or missing metrics (if applicable).

f. Description of major accomplishments in fulfilling PCSRF authorized activities and program priorities, using past PCSRF funds (if applicable), including a history of project funding, types of projects funded, and outcomes. This may include reference to reports that the applicant has completed on their past accomplishments.

2. Tribal Project Proposal(s). A separate narrative for each proposed project must include the following details:

a. Project description including the (1) title of the project; (2) the

proposed funding requested; (3) proposed start/end dates; (4) location; (5) the name and status of anadromous salmonids that will benefit from the project; and, (6) a description of the proposed work including objectives and approaches.

b. The PCSRF Priority that the proposed project is intended to achieve. Include a description of how the project is designed to achieve the priority.

c. Description of the rationale, justification, expected measurable outcomes, and benefits to the species of the projects. The description should be supported quantitatively when possible (e.g., number/types of limiting factors by Recovery Plan, estimated miles/acres of habitat proposed for restoration, number/types of treaty/subsistence fisheries, number/names of watersheds/populations to be monitored, etc.)

5. Budget Narrative: Proposed budget for program administration costs and each priority with accompanying explanation, including quantified needs determination. Include an approved current negotiated indirect cost rate agreement (if applicable) and a detailed explanation of the matching share to be contributed by the applicant (States only). Each application will include a summary table that lists each of the components of the proposal and corresponding costs (include all projects/tasks under each of the four priorities), including matching costs.

6. Resumes/Qualifications of Key Staff: Should not exceed two (2) pages per individual, with an additional two (2) pages allowed for single summary description of all organizations or consultants named in the application.

7. References and Appendices (2 Page Limit)

C. Submission Dates and Times

Pre-applications are not mandatory, but are highly encouraged. They must be received no later than April 9, 2012 if the applicant expects to receive any feedback from NMFS regarding completeness of its package and initial determination of compliance with minimum requirements. Final applications should be submitted via Grants.gov and must be received no later than 11:59pm EST on April 23, 2012. For applications submitted through Grants.gov, a date and time receipt indication will be the basis of determining timeliness. The proposal must be validated by Grants.gov in order to be considered timely. PLEASE NOTE: It may take Grants.gov up to two (2)

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No facsimile or electronic mail proposals will be accepted.

D. Intergovernmental Review

Applications under this program from state or local governments are subject to the provisions of Executive Order 12372, "Intergovernmental Review of Federal Programs." Any applicant submitting an application for funding is required to complete item 16 on the SF-424 regarding clearance by the State Single Point of Contact (SPOC) established as a result of EO 12372. To find out about and comply with a State's process under EO 12372, the names, addresses and phone numbers of participating SPOC's are listed in the Office Management and Budget's home page at www.whitehouse.gov/omb/grants/spoc.html.

E. Funding Restrictions

As program entities, the States, Tribal Commissions, and Consortia will expend not more than 3% of the direct federal funds for administrative expenses. Administrative expenses are defined as all costs, including direct and indirect costs, incurred by the State, Commission, or Consortium in administering the PCSRF grant and managing the distribution of the PCSRF grant funds to sub-recipients, contractors, programs, or projects that undertake PCSRF activities. Administrative expenses include activities such as sub-agreement and contracts management and monitoring, accounting, program oversight, program support and overhead costs, and competitive funding allocation processes including the processing and administrative review of project applications and proposals. The 3% limitation on administrative expenses is not applicable to individual Tribes applying directly on their own behalf for projects. The State, Tribal Commission, or Consortium PCSRF data management programs, including the PCSRF web-based project tracking data management

database system (found at <https://www.webapps.nwfsc.noaa.gov/PCSRFPhaseII>), do not fall within the administrative expenses. This includes the costs for implementing new requirements under Phase II of the PCSRF database.

V. Application Review Information

A. Evaluation Criteria

NOAA standardized the evaluation and selection process for its competitive assistance programs. All proposals submitted in response to this notice shall be evaluated and selected in accordance with the process set out below. In considering the funding allocation for projects and program applications, all proposals will be evaluated on the following criteria.

The technical evaluation totals 100 points and consists of two components: 1) A program-level evaluation that will be scored with a maximum of 40 points; and, 2) an evaluation of proposals under the four priorities with a maximum score of 60 points. The components of a proposal addressing each priority will be evaluated separately and the respective points under each priority will then be weighted based on the relative ranking of the PCSRF priorities and the distribution of the requested funds among the PCSRF priorities. NOAA anticipates a greater proportion of the available FY 2012 PCSRF funding will be distributed to higher scoring proposals addressing the higher priorities.

Program-level evaluation [40 Points]

1. Overall qualifications of the applicant [25 Points]: This ascertains whether the applicant possesses the necessary education, experience, training, facilities, existing programs, and administrative resources to accomplish the proposed program or projects. The organization and its management will be evaluated. The principal investigator and other personnel, including subcontractors and consultants

participating in the project or program will be evaluated in terms of related experience and qualifications. Successful applications will include the narrative requirements described in section IV.B.4 of this Federal Funding Opportunity announcement, above.

2. Project costs [15 Points]: Applications will be evaluated on the details of their proposed budget to determine if the costs are realistic and commensurate with the program or project needs and time-frame. Successful applications will include the following:

a. A justification and rationale for the amount of funding proposed by geographical area to meet the PCSRF program priorities. The justification and need for funding should be supported by evidence and described quantitatively when possible (e.g., miles/acres of habitat needing restoration; number or extent of ESA listed Pacific salmon or Pacific salmon at risk; stocks important for tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing, etc.). The description should also address the recipients other sources of funding for salmonid programs and projects.

b. Detailed budgets by program or project(s) that itemize the proposal costs including administrative and overhead costs.

c. A description (for States, Tribal Commissions, and Consortiums) of their monitoring effort that will account for at least ten percent (10%) of the funding proposed.

d. A description (for State applications) of the sources and amounts of matching funds (including details on sources and determinations on estimated value of any in-kind contributions) that will be applied to achieve the minimum matching requirements of 33% of the federal funds requested.

3. Outreach and education [0 Points]: Outreach and education, as defined by NOAA under the standardized evaluation and selection process, is not being evaluated under this competition.

Evaluation of Proposals under each PCSRF Priority [60 points]

1. Importance and/or relevance and applicability of proposed project to the program goals. [30 Points]: This ascertains whether there is intrinsic value in the proposed work and its relevance to the applicable PCSRF priority. Proposals will be evaluated based on how relevant and effective the proposals are in providing demonstrable and measurable benefits to the highest priority needs of anadromous salmonids in respective geographic areas. Successful applications will include the following information in their project narratives:

a. Narrative descriptions (for Priority One proposals) that clearly articulate how projects will address identified limiting factors for ESA-listed anadromous salmonids and how the proposal advances the recovery of ESA-listed salmonids.

b. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Two proposals) that clearly identify area(s) of greatest need for habitat restoration or protection projects necessary for the exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing and/or conservation of salmonids at-risk of being ESA listed. This includes descriptions of how projects will be designed and selected to achieve maximum benefits to anadromous salmonids.

c. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Three proposals) that clearly justify the type and location of monitoring proposals and how the results of proposed monitoring will be applied to conservation and restoration of anadromous salmonids.

d. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Four proposals) that demonstrate and justify an urgent need for funding to achieve a measurable benefit for the conservation and restoration of anadromous salmonids.

2. Technical/scientific merit [30 Points]: This assesses whether the approach is technically sound and/or innovative, if the methods are appropriate, and whether there are clear project goals and objectives. Proposals will be evaluated on whether there is a technically sound approach to manage and implement proposed projects; whether there is sufficient information to evaluate the project or program technically; and, if so, the strengths and/or weaknesses of the project or program approach to securing productive results. Successful applications will include the following information in their project narratives:

a. Narrative descriptions (for Priority One proposals) that clearly articulate the selection and design of viable projects that will effectively address limiting

factors for ESA-listed anadromous salmonids.

b. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Two proposals) that clearly articulate the selection and design of viable habitat restoration or protection projects necessary for the exercise of tribal treaty fishing rights or native subsistence fishing and/or conservation of salmonids at-risk of being ESA listed.

c. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Three proposals) that clearly articulate the proposed monitoring methodology and design for producing scientifically valid results at the watershed or population scales.

d. Narrative descriptions (for Priority Four proposals) that clearly articulate proposed methodologies designed to achieve measurable benefits to anadromous salmonids, and substantiate the urgency and need of the proposed activities.

B. Review and Selection Process

Upon receipt of an application, an initial administrative review will be conducted to determine compliance with requirements and completeness of the application. The application must meet the following minimum requirements to be considered for funding.

1. Applicant is eligible to apply
2. Application received by deadline
3. Application is complete and includes all mandatory forms
4. Matching requirements are met (State Only)
5. Administrative programmatic costs are not exceeded (State, Tribal Commission, and Consortium only)

Technical Review: Individual evaluations comprised of at least three (3) or more private and public experts will independently evaluate the applications and score them using the evaluation criteria set forth above. No consensus advice will be given. The reviewer' ratings will be averaged to produce a rank order of the proposals. Technical reviewers will be required to certify that they do not have a conflict of interest and that they will maintain confidentiality of the applications.

Panel Review: After the projects have been evaluated and ranked, NMFS will solicit comments and input on funding recommendation from a panel of at least three (3) federal full-time employees comprised of the NMFS Alaska Region, Northwest Region and Southwest Region. NMFS will provide the panelists with a summary of the technical review evaluations and the rank order of the proposals.

C. Selection Factors

The Assistant Administrator for NMFS will be the Selecting Official. The Selecting Official will review the rank order, funding recommendations and comments from the Panel Review and determine the recipients to be funded and how much funding shall be awarded to each selected recipient. In making the final selections, the Selecting Official will award in rank order unless the proposal is justified to be selected out of rank order based upon one of the selection factors below.

1. Availability of funding

2. PCSRF Priority: All four priorities will be funded at some level, but more funds will be assigned to proposals in the higher priorities.

3. Balance/distribution of funds

a. Geographically

b. By type of institutions

c. By type of partners

d. By research areas

e. By project types

4. Whether this project duplicates other projects funded or considered for funding by NOAA or other federal agencies.

5. Program priorities and policy factors as set forth in the Full Funding Opportunity Sections I.A. and B.

6. Applicant's prior award performance. (Accomplishments related to PCSRF goals)

7. Partnerships and/or participation of targeted groups.

D. Anticipated Announcement and Award Dates

Unsuccessful applicants will be notified through Grants Online. The NOAA Grants Officer will issue the grant award, Form CD-450, which is the authorizing financial assistance award document. Funding is expected to begin during July 2012 for most approved awards, subject to the availability of funds. July 1, 2012 will be used as the start date on awards, unless a later date is requested by recipient (and approved by the NOAA Grants Officer) or otherwise directed by the NOAA Grants Officer.
