### Funding Opportunity Description

The purpose of this program is to encourage or enhance tribal engagement with or participation in existing Regional Ocean Partnerships (ROPs) around the country. Proposals submitted in response to this announcement must:

- support tribal activities aligned with ROP priorities, including identification of ocean and coastal priorities;
- provide opportunities for tribes to work together to define intertribal ocean and coastal management priorities and identify alignment and intersection with ROP priorities;
- enhance or create capacity for tribes to engage with and in ROP activities (e.g., webinars, meetings, workshops);

- support the development of partnerships or engagement between a tribal government and a ROP in the management of ocean and coastal resources; and/or
- increase consideration and inclusion of tribal information and knowledge (as appropriate) in regional data portals, enhance tribes' ability to access data developed by ROPs, or to inform which data and tools are available in regional data portals.

Eligible applicants are U.S. federally-recognized Indian Tribes that have current and/or ancestral interests in a region with an established Regional Ocean Partnership and wish to pursue coastal and ocean activities that align with Regional Ocean Partnership priorities. The established Regional Ocean Partnerships are: the Gulf of Mexico Alliance (<https://gulfofmexicoalliance.org/>); the West Coast Ocean Alliance (<https://westcoastoceanalliance.org/>); the Northeast Regional Ocean Council (<https://www.northeastoceanCouncil.org/>); and, the Mid Atlantic Regional Council on the Ocean (<https://www.midatlanticocean.org/>). Tribal-serving organizations may apply on behalf of one or more tribes, but must include a letter(s) from the tribe(s) confirming tribal leadership support for the application and describing how the tribe will be involved in the proposed work. This funding announcement is supported by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA, Public Law 117-58), 135 STAT. 1356 (Nov. 15, 2021), also referred to as the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL); both terms may be used interchangeably throughout this document.

Applicant organizations must complete and maintain three registrations to be eligible to apply for or receive an award. These registrations include SAM.gov, Grants.gov, and eRA Commons. All registrations must be completed prior to the application being submitted. The complete registration process for all three systems can take 4 to 6 weeks, so applicants should begin this activity as soon as possible. If an eligible applicant does not have access to the internet, please contact the Agency Contacts listed in Section VII for submission instructions.

Prior to registering with eRA Commons, applicant organizations must first obtain a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) from SAM.gov, if needed (refer to Section IV. Applications and Submission Information, Section C). Organizations can register with eRA Commons in tandem with completing their full SAM and Grants.gov registrations; however, all registrations must be in place by time of application submission. eRA Commons requires organizations to identify at least one Signing Official (SO) and at least one Program Director/Principal Investigator (PD/PI) account in order to submit an application.

## Full Text of Announcement

### I. Funding Opportunity Description

#### A. Program Objective

This program complements a separate funding program for established Regional Ocean Partnerships (ROPs), which seeks to enhance and sustain the efforts of those ROPs to coordinate interstate and intertribal management of ocean and coastal management issues. The scope of work under this program focuses on encouraging or enhancing tribal involvement in or engagement with established ROPs, and/or tribal activities related to ROP priority actions. Proposals submitted under this competition must directly relate to priorities of established ROPs, either through tribal engagement in or with ROPs, or tribal activities closely aligned with ROP priorities.

Ineligible project activities are described in Section III.C, "Other Criteria that Affect Eligibility", below.

#### B. Program Priorities

Successful proposals will be those that most strongly meet the evaluation criteria (Section V.A), including those criteria related to the program priorities described below. Proposals must be related to one or more of the following program priorities:

- **Capacity Building for Tribal Engagement in Regional Ocean Partnerships.** Support for the development of partnerships and engagement between a tribal government and a ROP. Support for tribal capacity to engage with/in ROPs and ROP priority work, including in person travel (e.g., to engage and meet with ROPs and/or pursue and develop a relationship with their region's ROP), and virtual engagement (webinars, online meetings).
- **Ocean and Coastal Data Sharing, Accessibility and Application to Inform Management.** Support to increase consideration and inclusion of tribal information and knowledge (as appropriate) in regional data portals, enhance tribes' ability to access data developed by ROPs, or to inform which data and tools are available in regional data portals.
- **Intertribal Ocean and Coastal Coordination.** Support for tribes to work together to define intertribal ocean and coastal management priorities, including coordination and priority setting towards enhanced engagement or potential collaboration with ROPs.
- **Specific activities related to ROP priorities that advance intergovernmental ocean and coastal management activities** Support for tribal activities aligned with ROP priorities, including tasks to identify, vet, and advance ROP priorities.

Applicants should describe how their proposed work aligns with the priorities of the established ROP in their region. If applicants are already involved with or engaged in the ROP in their region, they should describe their role and nature of their involvement. Applicants are encouraged to, but not required to, submit a letter of support or acknowledgment from the ROP in their region to promote coordination and awareness.

### C. Program Authority

The mission of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is to understand and predict changes in the Earth's environment and conserve and manage coastal and marine resources to meet our Nation's economic, social, and environmental needs.

Statutory authority for this program is provided under Coastal Zone Management Act, 16 U.S.C. 1456c (Technical Assistance) and the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public Law 117-58.

## II. Award Information

### A. Funding Availability

NOAA anticipates approximately \$1.5 million will be available under this opportunity, with applicants being able to request up to 2 years of funding per award. NOAA anticipates typical federal funding awards will range from \$50,000 to \$200,000 per year. NOAA will not accept proposals with a federal funding request of more than \$400,000 for a 2-year award, inclusive of both direct and indirect costs. See Section II.B below for more information on the options for the award period.

The exact amount of funds that may be awarded will be determined in pre-award negotiations between the applicant and NOAA. Any funds provided to successful applicants for subsequent-year funding requests will be determined by progress towards stated milestones and availability of funding at the discretion of the NOAA Office for Coastal Management.

If an applicant incurs any costs prior to receiving an award agreement signed by an authorized NOAA official, the applicant does so at their own risk of not being selected and these costs not being included in a subsequent award. Direct costs of proposal preparation shall not be included within the project application budget. In addition, NOAA and DOC will not be responsible for project costs if this program fails to receive funding. Recipients and subrecipients are subject to all federal laws and agency policies, regulations, and procedures applicable to federal financial assistance awards. The lead applicant on any proposal will be responsible for ensuring that allocated funds are used for the purposes of, and in a manner consistent with, this program, including any funds awarded to an eligible sub-awardee.

Proposals not funded through this announcement, may be considered for funding in future fiscal years without NOAA repeating the competitive process outlined in this announcement. Funding in subsequent fiscal years encompassing the proposed period of performance is subject to the availability of appropriations.

## **B. Project/Award Period**

One-year or multi-year awards (up to two years of funding) will be considered. Proposals for multi-year funding should outline the costs expected for year 1 and year 2 in detail in this proposal (see Section IV.B for more details about the budget narrative for multi-year awards). NOAA expects, but is not obligated, to provide additional funding to multi-year awards in subsequent years. The second year of funding for a multi-year award, is contingent on the availability of out-year funding, continued relevance to program objectives and priorities, and performance under the current award, and is at the sole discretion of NOAA.

NOAA anticipates the start date for awards will be May 1, 2025 and should be for an award period of 18 to 24 months for a one-year funding award (if requesting only 1 year of funding), or the award period can be up to 36 months for a multi-year award (if requesting 2 years of funding).

## **C. Type of Funding Instrument**

The funding instrument for these awards will be a cooperative agreement. Federal cooperative agreements are different from traditional grants in that they allow for substantial federal involvement in the planning and implementation of funded projects if desired by the applicant. Substantial involvement on the part of NOAA may include the collaboration and participation of NOAA program officers and other NOAA Office for Coastal Management staff in project development, planning and implementation; technical assistance with accessing and applying existing data, tools, and management practices; technical monitoring of award activities; and coordination of funded projects with other NOAA-funded efforts as needed. Applicants may propose anticipated federal roles and responsibilities in their proposals, or NOAA may establish the particular involvement. Please note that federal agencies and employees are not allowed to receive funds under this announcement.

NOAA employees are not permitted to assist in the preparation of applications. NOAA Office for Coastal Management staff are available to provide general information on programmatic goals and objectives, and Regional Ocean Partnership priorities. For proposals that involve collaboration with current NOAA projects or staff, NOAA employees may provide a limited statement verifying the nature and extent of the collaboration and confirming prior coordination activities. Letters of support from NOAA employees are not allowable and will not be included among the application materials considered by merit reviewers.

# **III. Eligibility Information**

## **A. Eligible Applicants**

Eligible funding applicants include U.S. federally-recognized Indian Tribes and Tribal organizations as defined at 25 U.S.C. Section 5304. See also 2 CFR 200.1. While tribal organizations are allowed to apply on behalf of one or more tribes, they must include a letter confirming tribal leadership support for the application and describing how the tribe will be involved in the proposed work.

Eligible applicants must have current and/or ancestral interests in a region with an established Regional Ocean Partnership and wish to pursue coastal and ocean activities that align with Regional Ocean Partnership priorities. The established Regional Ocean Partnerships are:

- the Gulf of Mexico Alliance (<https://gulfofmexicoalliance.org/>);
- the West Coast Ocean Alliance (<https://westcoastoceanalliance.org/>);
- the Northeast Regional Ocean Council (<https://www.northeastoceancouncil.org/>); and,
- the Mid Atlantic Regional Council on the Ocean (<https://www.midatlanticocean.org/>).

Tribal-serving organizations may apply on behalf of one or more tribes, but must include a letter(s) from the tribe(s) confirming tribal leadership support for the application and describing how the tribe will be involved in the proposed work. Each tribal government may be involved in up to two applications which may include individual tribal proposals and/or involvement in an intertribal proposal. See III.C. below for more details.

Organizations that identify as Indian tribes but do not meet the definition of “Indian tribe” or “tribal organization” as defined at 25 U.S.C. section 5304(e) or (l), which may include State recognized tribes, may not receive direct funding under this announcement, but may participate in partnership applications with eligible tribes or tribal organizations, or through involvement in a separate NOAA Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act funding opportunity for Regional Ocean Partnerships published at [www.grants.gov](http://www.grants.gov).

Federal agencies and employees are not allowed to receive funds under this announcement, but may serve as collaborative project partners. If federal agencies are collaborators, applicants are expected to provide detail on the planned level of federal engagement in the application. Examples may include, but are not limited to, partnership services, serving in a review capacity, or participating in priority task teams, working groups, or leadership teams. To be eligible to apply or receive an award, applicant organizations must complete and maintain three registrations; SAM.gov, Grants.gov, and eRA Commons. For each, the complete registration process can take 4 to 6 weeks, so applicants must begin this activity as soon as possible and well before the proposal due date. ## **B. Cost Share or Matching Requirement**

Pursuant to the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, Public Law 117-58, Division J, Title II, 135 STAT. 1357, match is waived for this funding opportunity.

## **C. Other Criteria that Affect Eligibility**

Each tribal government may be involved in up to two applications which may include individual tribal proposals and/or involvement in an intertribal proposal. Intertribal proposals may be submitted by a tribal organization, or by one tribe on behalf of other tribes who will be collaborating in the proposal. Please note: if multiple tribes submit separate proposals for their own portion of a collaborative intertribal project, there is no guarantee that each one will be successful. Tribes should consider having a single eligible applicant (tribal organization or a tribe) submit one proposal that would fund all the tribes involved in the intertribal effort.

Tribal governments are encouraged to work with other tribes with shared priorities in the same region.

Foreign governments are not considered eligible applicants.

The following information describes ineligible project proposal types and activities for this announcement:

- Construction;
- Large scale restoration projects (please note there are other NOAA funding opportunities, including: Restoring Tribal Priority Fish Passage through Barrier Removal Grants; Transformational Habitat Restoration and Coastal Resilience Grants; Coastal Habitat Restoration and Resilience Grants for Underserved Communities; and the National Coastal Resilience Fund; that include habitat restoration as an eligible activity);
- Land acquisition (fee or easement);
- Activities not related to ROP priorities;

- Staffing/Capacity for tribal work not related to engaging in, coordinating with, and/or partnering with an established ROP or not in alignment with the Program Priorities described in Section 1.B;
- Data collection or creation not directly related to an identified regional data priority or a priority of the ROP; and
- Data collection or environmental condition monitoring activities where the results cannot be used by or integrated with the ROP activities or data sharing efforts, or where there is not a clear plan to integrate the data.

## IV. Application and Submission Information

### A. Address to Request Application Package

Information about the recommended format for applications is contained in Section IV.B.

### B. Content and Form of Application

Applicants should submit a complete standard NOAA financial assistance application package in accordance with the guidelines in this document. All application materials should use a legible 11- or 12-point font with 1-inch margins on all sides. Electronic applications must be submitted as Adobe Acrobat (.PDF) to the extent possible.

Organizations applying for a federal grant must be registered with these three systems:

- [eRA.nih.gov](http://eRA.nih.gov)
- [SAM.gov](http://SAM.gov)
- [Grants.gov](http://Grants.gov)

- Do not use “bundling” or “portfolio” features to combine PDFs into a single document. Everything must be visible in the PDF.
- Descriptive filenames may only be 50 characters or less (including spaces).
- Keep attachment file size to 100 MB or less.
- eRA Commons won’t accept any pages larger than the U.S. standard letter paper size (8.5” x 11”).

We strongly recommend that applicants attempt to submit their full proposals at least a few days prior to the due date in case these or other issues impact your submission, as they are not reasons we can extend the deadline. The complete application package should include the following forms and documents:

1. A project description (proposal), as described in the application component section below, should be limited to no more than 10 pages single spaced. The application should also include a title page, table of contents, and a 1 to 2-page project summary, but these three items will not count towards the page limit.

Project descriptions that exceed the 10-page limit will be shortened by removing pages at the end of the proposal narrative (see the "Project Description" section below) before it is forwarded to merit reviewers for evaluation. Pages removed from lengthy applications will not be reviewed or considered.

2. The following Federal forms should be included in the application package, as applicable (no page limit with forms and related mandatory federal form information). Please note that these federal forms must be filled out in a Grants.gov Workspace.:

i. Application for Federal Assistance: Form SF-424.

Applicants requesting Federal funding under this program must submit a copy of SF-424, 'Application for Federal Assistance'. If the applicant submits a hard copy of the final application, the SF-424 must be signed and dated by the organization's authorized representative and used as the cover page for the final application. An electronic signature and date stamp will automatically be included on SF-424 forms submitted via Grants.gov. Applicants will be required to enter their organization's Congressional District in the SF424 R&R form. Applicants are now required to register in eRA Commons for grant application and management. In order to successfully submit a proposal through eRA, the PI listed on the application materials must have an eRA Commons account, and that Commons account must be (1) affiliated with the applicant organization and (2) hold the PI role within that organization. The valid affiliated Commons Username (not PI name or email address) must then be included in the application materials, including on the SF-424 (question 4, "Applicant Identifier" box).

ii. Budget Information for Non-construction Programs: Form SF-424A.

Applicants are required to submit a SF-424A Budget Form to summarize the budget for the proposed scope of work. The first column of Sections A and B shows the federal funds requested, while the second column of Sections A and B shows the non-federal matching funds provided for the project. Total award funding is shown in the final column of Section B. Non-federal funding is broken out by source in Section C. Forecasted cash needs in Section D should be inclusive of all funding for multiyear projects. Federal and non-federal funds should be expended at a similar rate throughout the course of the project. Section E may be left blank. Section F summarizes the direct charges in line 21 and lists the indirect charges requested; please show the rate used in line 22. Multi-year awards will have out year funds shown in Section E. Please note that completion of the SF-424A form as described above represents NOAA's preference and may not be consistent with the instructions that accompany the SF-424A form. All budget figures should match the funding requested on the application cover sheet and correspond with the descriptions contained in the project and budget narratives. Each proposed sub-award of \$25,000 or more should be accompanied by a separate SF-424A form to fully document the proposed subaward budget.

v. Disclosure of Lobbying Activities: Form SF-LLL (if applicable)

Federal forms and National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) information described below in this Section, as well as information provided to complete the federal forms (e.g. Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate Agreement), can be submitted separately or combined and submitted as one PDF document.

There is a 100 megabyte file size limit on individual files. Applicants can upload multiple files to avoid exceeding the 100 megabyte file size limit.

**All applications should contain the following components:**

**Title Page (Proposal Cover Sheet)**

1. Project title
2. Proposed project period (start and end dates)
3. Type of project (i.e., grant or cooperative agreement)
4. Recipient name (must match registered name in Sam.gov)
5. Recipient Unique Entity Identifier number (must match applicant information in SAM.Gov)
6. Principal and other investigators (names, organization, and contact information)
7. Financial representative (names, organization, and contact information)
8. Requested funding by year (as appropriate) (if the project intends to have NOAA retain funds for technical assistance on the project, note the amounts by year and line office using the funds)
9. If the project is intended to be administered under an existing NOAA Cooperative Institute, state which Institute will administer the award.

**Project Summary.** Provide a one to two-page summary of the proposed project. The summary should contain the following sections:

1. Project name/title
2. Requested funding by year (as appropriate)
3. Brief project summary including objectives, expected results, and intended benefits and outcomes.

**Project Description.** All project descriptions should include the following sections (limited to 10-pages for all items in this section). Applications should provide sufficient detail to enable reviewers to evaluate the relevance and applicability of the proposed work to program priorities described in Section I.B of this announcement; to determine the technical/scientific merit of the proposed work; to adequately review the qualifications of the applicants; and to assess whether the proposed scope of work raises any concerns with regard to federal policy considerations, such as those related to the National Environmental Policy Act, Endangered Species Act, Historic Preservation Act, and Marine Mammal Protection Act.

1. **Goal and Objective(s).** Describe in the narrative the specific project goals and objectives to be achieved. Goals and objectives must be specific for each year of the work plan presented. Describe how the proposed work aligns with the priorities of the established Regional Ocean Partnership (ROP) in the applicant's region; this information should be publicly available on the website for each ROP. These websites are listed in Section III.A, Eligible Applicants, above. Describe the tribe's existing level of engagement with the ROP in their region. Recipients will be required to submit semi-annual progress reports in which progress against these goals and objectives will be reported.
2. **Alignment with Program Priorities.** Describe how the proposed work aligns with one or more of the program priorities identified in I.B above.
3. **Background.** Provide sufficient background information for NOAA and non-NOAA reviewers to independently assess the significance of the proposed project. Summarize the problem, gap or need, and network to be addressed and the status of ongoing efforts and coordination to address the identified needs or gaps. Summarize the relationship of the proposed work to other regional efforts.

4. **Technical Approach.** Provide a work plan that: identifies specific tasks to be accomplished; explains the technical approach (including quality assurance) needed to accomplish the tasks; identifies the roles of partners and cooperators; and identifies potential obstacles to successful completion of the goals and objectives. If the project includes federal partners, the roles and responsibilities of the federal partners must be clearly identified. If environmental data will be created under the award, the work plan must clearly address data management requirements and the steps to be taken to achieve efficient and effective data access and data archive that are compliant with federal regulations (see Data Management requirements under Section IV.B). If no environmental data will be produced through the proposal, or if data is not publicly accessible due to law, regulation, policy (such as those applicable to personally identifiable information or protected critical infrastructure information or proprietary trade information) or by security requirements, then the application must include a clear explanation as to why no data management plan is being submitted.
5. **Milestone Schedule.** Display time lines for major tasks, target milestones for important intermediate and final products, and key project outcomes.
6. **Applicant Expertise.** Identify any tribal expertise, knowledge holders, and personnel who will be directly involved with or contributing to the project. Describe where in the tribal government the applicant or PIs work, and how their expertise is relevant to the proposal. Identify any contractual expertise being used for the project, including a brief background and their experience working with tribes. Also identify the key individuals who will be corresponding with tribal managers and/or leadership, with descriptions as to their role(s) in the proposed project work. Describe any standards of practice, tribal protocols or guidelines, and/or any other frameworks that will help guide the engagement between tribal expertise and contractor expertise. Describe any prior experience the applicant has in managing, administering, and reporting on federal or other external project funding. If a tribal organization is submitting an application on behalf of one or more tribes, be sure to include a letter confirming tribal leadership support for the application and describing how the tribe will be involved in the proposed work.
7. **Outreach and Education.** Describe who will use or be engaged in the final project outcomes. Describe how the results of the proposal will benefit the tribe and or provide connections to other tribes and/or the Regional Ocean Partnership.
8. **Partnerships.** Describe how the Regional Ocean Partnership, or other partners will interact with the project, the communication mechanism utilized to engage the partners, and describe how they will use the outcome or results of the project. Describe the roles of partners and indicate any efforts or resources that will be leveraged in the project. Letters of collaboration from project partners and any letters of acknowledgment or support from other entities shall be included in the appendices as appropriate.
9. **Task Outcomes or Products.** Identify and describe the anticipated project products or outcomes. Explain how they will benefit the tribe, Regional Ocean Partnership and/or the general coastal resource management community). Describe performance measures that will be used to evaluate project success. The narrative should include information on dissemination of the findings/results to resource managers, local communities, and other stakeholders as appropriate. The project description should include information on how the project will be evaluated for success.

#### **Budget Narrative and Justification**

In order to allow reviewers to evaluate the appropriateness of all costs, applications should include a detailed budget narrative and justification of costs broken out by individual task. The budget narrative submitted with the final application should match the dollar amounts included on all required forms and clearly link to the project narrative. 3. Scope of Work. List and describe the specific activities or tasks to be performed.
4. Criteria for Measuring Accountability: Include an itemized line item breakdown as well as total contract/award amount. If applicable, include any indirect costs paid under the contract/award and the indirect cost rate used.
5. Itemized Budget. Include categories used in the program budget for subrecipients or cost-based contractors. If applicable, include any direct cost paid under the subaward or contract and the indirect cost rate used.

All subawards and contracts must be made consistent with the requirements of 2 CFR 200.331-200.333 for subawards, and 200.317-200.327 for procurements.

For any equipment, a description of the item and associated costs or price is required, including a description of how it will be used in the project. Note that equipment is defined as tangible personal property (including information technology systems) having a useful life of more than one year and a per-unit acquisition cost which equals or exceeds the lesser of the capitalization level established by the non-federal entity for financial statement purposes, or \$5,000. Applicants may factor in travel costs for participation in an annual NOAA Grants Management Division (GMD) workshop for recipients.

Refer to item “Negotiated Indirect Cost Rate Agreement” below in this Section regarding treatment of Indirect Costs in the Budget Narrative.

### **Appendices**

Appendices should be limited to materials that directly support the main body of the proposal (e.g. resumes, references, lists of relevant work products or reports, detailed methodologies, data sources, detailed budget narrative, letters of collaboration, letters of support, lists of data sources, and maps) and should not exceed a maximum of 20 pages (over and beyond the page limit for the “Project Description”, above). Applicants should number the pages in their proposal and any appendices. Applicants may upload the appendices and supporting information by using the 'Optional Form' box under 'Other Attachments' in Grants.gov during the application submission process.

As a standard practice, NOAA requires that resumes for Principal Investigators (PIs) of competitive awards be on file and maintained in the grants processing system used by the Department of Commerce, eRA Commons. Recipients of any award (competitive or non-competitive) are required to designate PIs in eRA Commons within 30 days of receiving award offers.

The following appendix documents should be included in the application package:

The Data Management Plan should address the requirements in this section of the Announcement.
  1. Environmental data and information collected or created under NOAA grants or cooperative agreements must be made discoverable by and accessible to the public, in a timely fashion (typically within two years), free of charge or at no more than the cost of reproduction, unless an exemption is granted by the NOAA Program. Data should be available in at least one machine-readable format, preferably a widely used or open-standard format, and should be accompanied by machine-readable documentation (metadata), preferably based on widely used or international standards.
  2. Proposals submitted in response to this Announcement must include a Data Management Plan of up to two pages describing how these requirements will be satisfied. **National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and Environmental Compliance** -- Under (NEPA), NOAA must analyze the potential environmental impacts of projects or proposals seeking funding from NOAA. See Section VI.B below for NEPA Requirements.

#### **Permits and Approvals**

It is the responsibility of the applicant to obtain all necessary federal, state, and local government permits and approvals for the proposed work. Applicants must provide a list of all known permits that will be required to perform the proposed work and an indication of the status of any permits needed (e.g., not yet applied, permit application submitted/pending, permit granted, etc.) or a statement indicating that no permits are necessary. Applicants should include this required element even if permits are not required. Failure to apply for and/or obtain federal, state, and local permits, approvals, letters of agreement, or failure to provide environmental analyses where necessary (i.e., NEPA and environmental assessment) will delay or prevent the award of funds for projects that have been preliminarily selected for funding.

For work proposed within National Marine Sanctuaries, National Parks, National Seashores, and other federally designated managed areas, it is the responsibility of the applicant to request and obtain any necessary permits or letters of agreement from the appropriate government agencies prior to commencement of an award. The proposed budget may include an amount for indirect or "Facilities and Administrative" costs if the applicant has an established indirect cost rate with the federal government. Proposals submitted in response to this Announcement must include a Data Management Plan (up to 2 pages). See Section VI.B., Administrative and National Policy Requirements, below for additional information on what the plan should contain.

Applicants that are recommended for funding will be required to answer relevant questions from the NOAA National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) questionnaire. No questions are required at the time of application. If recommended for funding, the Federal program officer will determine which questions are relevant to each specific applicant. Answers must be provided before the application can be submitted for final funding approval. See Section VI.B, Administrative and National Policy Requirements, below for additional NEPA information.

### **C. Unique entity identifier and System for Award Management (SAM)**

Paper applications received more than 5 business days after the deadline will not be reviewed, and applicants submitting by paper are responsible for tracking their applications. ### **F. Funding Restrictions**

Ineligible projects and disallowed costs

In addition to the ineligible activities described in I.A. above, the following elements and activities will not be eligible for funding:

1. Activities that constitute legally required mitigation for the adverse effects of an activity regulated or otherwise governed by state or federal law.
2. Activities that constitute mitigation for natural resource damages under federal or state law.
3. Activities that are required by a separate consent decree, court order, statute or regulation.
4. Establishing or operating a Tribal office and/or purchase of office equipment not specific to the proposed project- including items so general they cannot be considered specific to the proposed project (e.g., vehicles, >3 laptops or tablets).
5. Supplementing employment for current positions not significantly and directly involved in the proposed project (e.g., positions like Executive Directors with little to no described involvement in the proposed work).
6. Legal fees (except per 2 CFR 200.435 and 200.459).
7. Contracted negotiation fees (e.g., legal counsel).
8. Fringe benefits of positions not significantly and directly involved in the proposed project (e.g., an Executive Director with little to no described involvement in proposed work).
9. Non-negotiated indirects (unless the entity is in the process of negotiations or has never received a negotiated indirect cost rate, then the 10% de minimus rate may be used).
10. Entertainment.
11. Any other activities not authorized by 2 CFR 200, Subpart E.

Cost Principles

Recipients are subject to the 2 CFR 200, Subpart E “Cost Principles,” as well as any DOC regulations that may be in effect at the time of award. Generally, allowable costs include salaries, fringe benefits, travel, equipment, supplies, and training, as long as the costs are determined to be necessary, reasonable, and allocable to the award.

## **G. Other Submission Requirements**

Applicant organizations must complete and maintain three registrations to be eligible to apply for or receive an award. These registrations include SAM.gov, Grants.gov, and eRA Commons. All registrations must be completed prior to the application being submitted. The complete registration process for all three systems can take 4 to 6 weeks, so applicants should begin this activity as soon as possible. Prior to registering with eRA Commons, applicant organizations must first obtain a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) from SAM.gov, if needed (refer to Section IV. Organizations can register with eRA Commons in tandem with completing their full SAM and Grants.gov registrations; however, all registrations must be in place by time of application submission. eRA Commons requires organizations to identify at least one Signing Official (SO) and at least one Program Director/Principal Investigator (PD/PI) account in order to submit an application.

The first PD/PI listed on the application must include their eRA Commons ID in the "Credential, e.g. agency login" Applicant Identifier field on the SF424 form. Failure to register in the Commons and to include a valid PD/PI Commons ID in the Applicant Identifier field will prevent the successful submission of an electronic application.

## **H. Address for Submitting Proposals**

The standard NOAA funding application package is available at [www.grants.gov](http://www.grants.gov) (Grants.gov) by searching the Funding Opportunity Number or the Federal Assistance Listings number (11.473). Application packages, including all letters of collaboration, shall be submitted through the “Apply” function on Grants.gov. The Grants.gov site contains directions for submitting an application, and all forms must be completed within the online “workspace” for Grants.gov. Applicants must register with Grants.gov before any application materials can be submitted. To use Grants.gov, applicants must have a Universal Identifier and be registered in SAM.gov, which requires periodic renewals. Refer to Section IV.C. for details on receiving a Universal Identifier and registering with SAM.gov.

After electronic submission of the application through Grants.gov, the person submitting the application will receive two email messages from Grants.gov within the next 24 to 48 hours updating them on the progress of their application. The first email provides a tracking number and confirms receipt of the application by the Grants.gov system. The second email indicates that the application has either been successfully validated by the system before transmission to the grantor agency or has been rejected because of errors. Only validated applications are sent to NOAA for review. After the application has been validated, this same person will receive a third email when the application has been downloaded by the federal agency.

If an applicant submits multiple electronic versions of the proposal, the applicant should advise the federal agency of the tracking number that should be withdrawn. Applicants shall not electronically submit packages with files embedded within files as any such files may not be reviewed or factored into the merit review process.

After electronic submission of the application, applicants will receive an automatic acknowledgment from Grants.gov that contains a Grants.gov tracking number. Applications submitted through Grants.gov will be accompanied by THREE automated responses (the first confirms receipt by Grants.gov, not NOAA; the second confirms that the submission is acceptable and timely; and the third validates that the application has been forwarded to NOAA for further processing).

The federal program office has a process to review for completeness. Administrative reviews generally take place after deadlines because the majority of applicants apply just before deadlines. If there are no time constraints and available resources, the federal agency may reach back to applicants who have submitted incomplete packages.

## Review and Selection Process

### Proposal Review and Selection Process:

An initial administrative review is conducted on each application to assure that it is timely, responsive, and complete. NOAA, in its sole discretion, may continue the review process for applications with non-substantive issues that may be easily rectified or cured. Applications that meet the minimum requirements will be reviewed by at least three independent reviewers during a merit-based review and ranking process. Appropriate mechanisms will be implemented to avoid potential conflicts of interest during the proposal review process. Each reviewer will be asked to individually evaluate and rank proposals using the weighted evaluation criteria above. Proposal evaluations will be based exclusively on information included in the application. Merit reviewer ratings will be used to produce a rank order of the proposals.

The Selecting Official, or their designee, may negotiate the funding level or other major aspects of the proposal, and the Selecting Official will make the final recommendation for award to the Grants Officer based on the rank order and selection factors in Section V. C. below to the Grants Officer, who is authorized to obligate Federal funding and execute the award.

NOAA may select all, some, or none of the applications, or part of any application, may ask applicants to work together or combine projects, may defer applications to the future, or may reallocate funds to different funding categories, to the extent authorized. If no proposal is funded in the current fiscal period, a proposal may be considered for funding in another fiscal period, without NOAA repeating the competitive process outlined in this announcement.

Please note that not all activities submitted under a single proposal may be deemed appropriate for funding, and the Selecting Official may recommend alternate activities as appropriate or only partial funding, based on the selection factors and the merit and/or panel review written evaluations. 5. Applicant's prior award performance.
6. Partnerships with/Participation of targeted groups.
7. Adequacy of information necessary for NOAA staff to make a NEPA determination and draft necessary documentation before recommendations for funding are made to the Grants Officer.

The Selecting Official or designee may negotiate the funding level of the proposal.

### **Anticipated Announcement and Award Dates**

Successful applicants will be notified in approximately January 2025. The earliest anticipated start date for cooperative agreement awards made under this competition will be May 1, 2025, dependent on funding availability, acceptable completion of all NOAA/applicant negotiations including NEPA and environmental compliance analysis and permit requirements, and the provision of other supporting documentation as requested.

Unsuccessful applicants will be notified by e-mail that their application was not recommended for funding after the final selection package has been approved by the NOAA Grants Management Division, which is expected to be approximately April 2025.

Unsuccessful applications submitted to this competition will be retained for three years and then destroyed.
