Executive Summary

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS or Service) is the premier government agency dedicated to the conservation, protection, and enhancement of fish, wildlife and plants, and their habitats. We are the only agency in the federal government whose primary responsibility is the conservation and management of these important natural resources for the American public. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's origins date back to 1871 when Congress established the U.S. Fish Commission to study the decrease in the nation's food fishes and recommend ways to reverse that decline. The FWS is committed to building and retaining a diverse and inclusive workforce that reflects the ethnic, age, socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds, and language diversity of contemporary America. The FWS operates a variety of

programs that promote wildlife conservation and public land management under the Public Lands Corps Act (PLC) through engagement, employment, and education of our nation's diverse youth and veterans.

FWS programs operating under the Public Lands Corps Act have been designated as covered programs under Justice40 (Executive Order 14008). The FWS strives to meet the Federal Government's goal that 40 percent of the overall benefits of certain Federal Investments flow to disadvantaged communities that are marginalized, underserved, and overburdened by pollution. The categories of investment are climate change, clean energy and energy efficiency, clean transit, affordable and sustainable housing, training and workforce development, remediation of reduction of legacy pollution, and the development of critical clean water and wastewater infrastructure.

The Public Lands Corps (PLC) Program is authorized by Congress under Title 16 USC Sec. 1721-1726; Public Law 109-154, Public Lands Corps Healthy Forests Restoration Act of 2005 (amends the Public Lands Corps Act of 1993), and all subsequent amendments. Guidance authorizes U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to (1) establish PLC Programs (2) certify participants who meet the PLC eligibility requirements for the PLC non-competitive hiring authority status, and (3) ensure consistent program standards throughout the FWS. The purpose of the FWS PLC programs (FWS Youth Corps) is to provide work and education opportunities for youth (defined as ages 16-30 inclusive, and up to age 35 for veterans) participants in the areas of natural and cultural resource conservation, development, and scientific research. Participants perform work on our nation's public lands by providing additional, unique capacity designed to boost the impact of the FWS for the conservation and management of fish, wildlife, plants and their habitats for the American people.

The FWS Youth Corps Program allows the FWS to establish partnerships with Partner organizations (FWS Youth Corps), generally defined as "qualified youth or conservation corps," using financial assistance/cooperative agreements or MOUs, to employ the next generation of conservationists in paid PLC projects and internships. Partners must be designated as an official member of the FWS Youth Corps in order to certify Participants. FWS Youth Corps application information is available in the attachments to this Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO).

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Program Goals

- Public Lands Corps Act (PLC) Hiring Authority Certification requires successful completion of a project with a minimum of 640 hours of satisfactory public service. Because PLC hours are cumulative for participants, an individual project is not required to meet the 640-hour public service goal. However, FWS Youth Corps members are encouraged to develop projects that meet or exceed the PLC Certification goal for the participant. In addition, 120 hours of the participant's project must occur or be in support of public or Indian lands.

Project types may include but are not limited to:

Wildlife and habitat management restoration

Invasive species removal

Trail building or maintenance

Wildfire or fuels management

Climate mitigation and resilience

Emergency and natural disaster relief

Visitor Services

Diversity and inclusion

Transporation and community connectiveness

Law enforcement

Infrastructure and maintenance

On an annual basis, FWS Youth Corps members are required to provide a PLC Participant Report detailing the total number of project sites, PLC hours earned, and number of interns. The report should also include the diversity of students placed, including demographics and age, to the extent that such information has been voluntarily provided by participants to the recipient.

Program Description

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) is the only federal government agency whose primary responsibility is to manage fish and wildlife resources for current and future generations. FWS is one of 11 bureaus within the Department of Interior. Our employees work to fulfill our mission on more than 560 National Wildlife Refuges, 70 National Fish Hatcheries, and numerous regional and field offices on thousands of active conservation projects across the country.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is committed to recruiting and hiring a highly qualified, diverse and inclusive workforce. Organizations that provide youth employment opportunities may partner with the FWS by joining the FWS Youth Corps. FWS Youth Corps Interns and fellows serve on National Wildlife Refuges, National Fish Hatcheries, or at regional offices and field stations. Areas of focus range from habitat restoration and invasive species management to environmental education and community engagement. Through partnerships, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service leads the way in developing community-driven conservation solutions that reap ecological and economic benefits for fish, wildlife and people.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service partners with 35-50 youth serving organizations (FWS Youth Corps) each year to implement Public Lands Corps Act projects. The purpose of FWS Youth Corps is to provide meaningful work, national service, and training-based opportunities for individuals who are 16 to 30 years old, and veterans who are 35 or younger, called "participants" throughout this document, in the areas of public lands management and natural and cultural resources conservation, development, and scientific research. As outlined in statute, the goals of the Public Lands Corps Act are to:

1. Perform, in a cost-effective manner, appropriate conservation projects on eligible lands where existing Government employees will not perform such projects.
2. Assist Governments and Tribes in performing research and public education tasks associated with natural and cultural resources on eligible lands.
3. Expose young people and veterans to public service while furthering their understanding and appreciation of the Nation's natural and cultural resources.
4. Stimulate interest among the Nation's youth in the FWS and conservation careers by exposing them to conservation, scientific research, and other professionals in the FWS, and offering them non-competitive hiring eligibility for Federal positions for which they qualify upon meeting program requirements.
5. Expand educational opportunities by rewarding individuals who participate in national service with an increased ability to pursue higher education or job training and allow participants the opportunity to seek forbearance on Stafford loans.

The FWS is committed to investing in our future workforce of conservation stewards by providing diverse participants paid opportunities through Public Lands Corps Act projects to make significant contributions to our mission. This special hiring authority provides the FWS with an opportunity to help meet the agency's goal of building a diverse and inclusive workforce. The FWS is committed to building and retaining a diverse and inclusive workforce that reflects the ethnic, age, socioeconomic and cultural backgrounds and language diversity of contemporary America. Participants are engaged to advance their educational background and training while

developing leadership skills through service to their community and the United States, ensuring the future of our wildlife habitats. Under the guidance, coaching, or mentoring of FWS staff, participants perform work to support our public lands by working to boost the impact of the FWS “for the conservation and management of fish, wildlife, plants and their habitats for the American people.”

Organizations interested in partnership with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for the purpose of implementing Public Lands Corps Act projects must apply for membership in the FWS Youth Corps. Membership in the FWS Youth Corps is solely for the purpose of partnering with FWS to engage youth in Public Lands Corps Act (PLC) projects. Membership does not commit the Government to contract for any supply or service whatsoever. Interested partner organizations may request membership in the FWS Youth Corps by submitting a proposal via e-mail to fwsyouthcorps@fws.gov. Proposals are accepted throughout the year. Organizations selected for inclusion in FWS Youth Corps must meet annual certification requirements but are not required to reapply under this NOFO.

PUBLIC PURPOSE and FWS SUBSTANTIAL INVOLVEMENT

Pre-application consultation is required to ensure that Public Lands Corps Act projects serve a public purpose, which is defined as government assistance for which the primary purpose is to promote the general welfare, security, prosperity, or public convenience as authorized by a federal law. Public Lands Corps Act projects must provide participants vocational and

educational opportunities gained through their participation, and public lands are improved as a result of the work they provide.

In addition, the FWS must be substantially involved in PLC projects. Pre-application consultation is required to ensure FWS substantial involvement. Substantial involvement is defined as significant FWS participation during the performance of a cooperative agreement. Examples include FWS involvement in program management decisions; FWS collaboration in the accomplishment of a project; or FWS operational involvement or participation on a project.

Summary of training, safety, housing, and transportation project contributions.

Sufficient information to support environmental compliance review requirements. Note: For projects that the following conditions are true, no additional environmental compliance is required:

Submission Instructions

Simplified Application Procedures for Certain Applicants and Applications

Certain applicants may be eligible to apply following the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) simplified application procedures. These procedures remove the requirement to register in and apply through the Department of the Interior's grants management system. You may be eligible to follow our simplified application procedures if all the following apply:

Your proposal requests \$200,000 or less from the FWS and, in the event an award is made, would not be expected to exceed that amount over the life of the award from the FWS, AND

You are not requesting funds to purchase land or for a major construction project, AND

Your proposed project can be completed within three years or less, AND

You are NOT a State, an Institution of Higher Education (except [Minority Serving Institutions](#)), or a large Nonprofit Organization (i.e., received more than \$10M from Department of the Interior bureaus and offices combined in the past three years)

Minority Serving Institutions meeting all other criteria are eligible to follow the simplified application procedures. If you and your project meet the above criteria and you do not want to register in and apply through the Department of the Interior's grants management system, do not follow the application instructions below. Instead, please contact us (see contact information below) to confirm your eligibility and request alternate application instructions. If you and your project do not meet the above criteria, follow our standard application instructions below.

APPLICATION REVIEW INFORMATION

Eligibility Review

During the eligibility review, the application is checked for timely submission, completed packages (see [Application Documents](#) above) and alignment with the requirements of this announcement. The Federal agency may remove an application if it does not pass the eligibility review.

- Organizations must be FWS Youth Corps members
- Projects must meet Public Lands Corps Act requirements
- Projects must be collaboratively developed between the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the FWS Youth Corps member

If an applicant selected for funding hasn't finished their SAM.gov registration (see [2 CFR 25.200](#) and [2 CFR 25.110](#)) when the federal agency is ready to make an award, we may decide that the applicant is ineligible for the award and choose to grant it to someone else. Please refer [2 CFR 25.205](#) for more information.

Prior to making an award, the DOI checks the anticipated recipient and their key project personnel against the current list of prohibited or restricted persons or entities in the System for Award Management (SAM.gov) Exclusions database. Merit Review

Priority Ranking factors: Field staff will give the highest funding priority status to proposed projects that meet more of the following conditions (sequence of listing does not imply order of preference):

- A. Recruitment for the proposed PLC project will involve targeted recruitment to maximize applications from racially and ethnically underrepresented groups.

Examples of targeted recruitment efforts that include:

- Indian Youth Service Corps - Tribal Colleges and Universities
- Historically Black Colleges and Universities
- Hispanic Serving Institutions
- Asian American and Native American and Pacific Islander Serving Institutions
- Broad based recruitment among disadvantaged (for all groups)

- B. Projects that will occur in a Justice40 community identified as disadvantaged or will involve targeted recruitment from a Justice40 community

- C. Projects that will instill in the participant a conservation ethic and sense of public service

- D. Projects that will provide job skills and training that could lead to a position with the FWS or similar natural resource position

- E. Projects that seek to offset or combat climate change through design and resiliency

Secondary Ranking factors: Field staff will give special consideration to projects that meet more of the following conditions (sequence of listing does not imply order of preference):

- A. From a review of the project narrative has the applicant demonstrated a clear understanding of the requirements of the position?

- B. Do the project activities and training opportunities provide sufficient opportunity for the participant to develop the skills, knowledge, and abilities necessary to compete for Service positions or comparable natural resource positions?

- C. Does the funding allocated to the support of the participant provide adequate funding to address economic barriers, provide adequate housing, and meet transportation needs?

- D. Does the applicant have in place a process for identifying and recruiting candidates from disadvantaged communities?

- E. Does the applicant have sufficient staff and organizational capabilities to recruit, place, and manage the proposed project?

Review and Selection Process

This program reviews proposed budgets to ensure:

- figures are correct
- estimated costs are necessary and reasonable and clearly linked to project narratives
- avoid obviously unallowable costs
- identify costs requiring prior approval

- ensure indirect cost rates are applied correctly
- confirm cost sharing requirements are reflected in the budget.

This program reviews applications for potential overlap or duplication between the proposed project and any other funded or proposed project. Depending on the circumstances, DOI may choose to not make an award.

1. FWS Project Officer will develop Project with eligible FWS Youth Corps member
2. FWS Project Officer will provide partner selection method as part of Merit Review process
3. FWS Youth Corps member will submit funded Project application through GrantSolutions
4. Project Application will be reviewed and scored by FWS Grant Management Specialist against Merit Review criteria
5. Projects that meet eligibility and sufficiency standards will be awarded
6. Projects that do not meet eligibility and sufficiency standards will be returned for correction.

Risk Review

Prior to making an award, the program assesses the risk posed by the applicant per [2 CFR 200.206](#). If an award will be made, the program may apply special conditions corresponding to the risk assessed.
