2. Executive Summary

Priority Region: Republic of Korea

Executive Summary

The U.S-Korea Talent Exchange Through Study Abroad program is a targeted study-abroad initiative designed to identify and develop exceptional Korean students whose skills, values, and ambitions align with U.S. economic, technological, and security priorities. The program fosters mutually beneficial partnerships between U.S. institutions and high-performing Korean students in fields critical to both nations' futures — including STEM, advanced manufacturing, defense technology, energy, and entrepreneurship.

The program will train a cohort of well-placed Korean teachers, guidance counselors, and international program administrators through a 3-day workshop at the American Diplomacy House on how to effectively guide well-qualified Korean students through the U.S. university admissions processes. After the workshop, participants will travel to the U.S. for 10 days to gain firsthand experience and knowledge of U.S. higher education opportunities. Following the study tour, each participant will be expected to deliver presentations alongside EducationUSA representatives to their Korean peers in person at the American Diplomacy House, American Corners, and networking events across the ROK.

B. Eligibility

1. Eligible Applicants

The following organizations are eligible to apply:

- Not-for-profit organizations, including think tanks and civil society/nongovernmental organizations
- Public and private educational institutions
- Public International Organizations and Governmental institutions

2. Cost Sharing or Matching

Cost sharing is not required. However, applicants may offer cost share voluntarily. While it will not affect the formal merit review scoring, the review panel may take it into account as an indicator of organizational commitment and capacity.

3. Other Eligibility Requirements

All organizations must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) issued via SAM.gov as well as a valid registration in SAM.gov. Please see Section D.3 for more information. Individuals are not required to have a UEI or be registered in SAM.gov.

C. Program Description

1. Goals and Objectives

Proposals must include an American element or connection with U.S. experts, organizations, or institutions and should clearly explain the applicants' previous experience running similar programs both in the Republic of Korea and United States.

The goal of this program is a focused study abroad and training initiative that recruits Korea's best and brightest students to study in U.S. institutions in disciplines directly tied to America's economic competitiveness, technological leadership, and national security. In support of this goal, the program will strengthen the capacity of Korean high school educators and advisors to guide students on pursuing post-secondary education in the United States. The program seeks to increase awareness and understanding of the U.S. higher education system, including admissions processes, financial aid, and various types of higher education institutions.

The program will include:

- A 3-day professional workshop at the American Diplomacy House (ADH) in Seoul, led by EducationUSA advisors, offering training on U.S. university admissions, financial considerations for international students, and building strong applications.
- A 10-day study tour in the United States, including visits to a diverse range of U.S.
 institutions (e.g., four-year universities, community colleges, and technical schools
 in both urban and rural settings), as well as cultural and home hospitality
 components.
- Post-tour in-person presentations by participants, in collaboration with EducationUSA, to share insights with peers at the American Diplomacy House and American Corners.
- Networking events connecting current participants with alumni from previous Embassy-sponsored counselor programs.

Expected outcomes include:

- Enhanced participant knowledge of U.S. higher education systems and admissions processes.
- Increased capacity to support Korean students seeking to study in the U.S.

 Strengthened networks among Korean educators promoting U.S. study abroad opportunities.

Applicants should budget for all program costs, including:

- Participant travel and lodging for both the Seoul-based workshop and the U.S. study tour,
- Domestic and international airfare,
- Per diem, insurance, interpretation (if needed), and transportation,
- Venue rental, speaker fees, and materials for workshops and presentations,
- Coordination of networking events and participant follow-up.

Participants must currently be working as schoolteachers or guidance counselors at Korean high schools that frequently send students overseas. Participants can also be international program administrators with experience advising students on college or graduate school admissions, particularly for U.S. schools or overseas study.

2. Substantial Involvement

This program will be funded through a cooperative agreement. The U.S. Embassy in Seoul will be substantially involved in the following aspects:

- Reviewing and providing input on program structure, schedule, and content;
- Approving participant selection criteria and final participant list;
- Coordinating with EducationUSA and Embassy personnel for workshop facilitation and post-program outreach;
- Participating in regular check-ins with the recipient to monitor progress, troubleshoot issues, and ensure alignment with U.S. government goals and public diplomacy objectives.

The recipient will be expected to consult closely with the Embassy throughout the program period to ensure effective implementation and consistent messaging about U.S. higher education opportunities.

- Introduction to the Organization or Individual applying: A description of past and present operations, showing ability to carry out the program, including information on all previous grants from the State Department and/or U.S. government agencies.
- **Problem Statement:** Clear, concise and well-supported statement of the problem to be addressed and why the proposed program is needed
- **Project Goals and Objectives:** The "goals" describe what the program is intended to achieve. The "objectives" refer to the intermediate accomplishments on the way to the goals. These should be achievable and measurable.
- **Project Activities**: Describe the program activities and how they will help achieve the objectives.
- **Project Methods and Design**: A description of how the program is expected to work to solve the stated problem and achieve the goal. Include a logic model as appropriate.
- **Proposed Project Schedule and Timeline:** The proposed timeline for the program activities. Include the dates, times, and locations of planned activities and events.
- **Key Personnel:** Names, titles, roles and experience/qualifications of key personnel involved in the program. What proportion of their time will be used in support of this

- program? What expertise do staff have running programs both in the Republic of Korea and United States?
- **Project Partners:** List the names and type of involvement of key partner organizations and sub-awardees.
- **Project Monitoring and Evaluation Plan:** This is an important part of successful grants. Throughout the time-frame of the grant, how will the activities be monitored to ensure they are happening in a timely manner, and how will the program be evaluated to make sure it is meeting the goals of the grant?
- **Future Funding or Sustainability** Applicant's plan for continuing the program beyond the grant period, or the availability of other resources, if applicable.

3. Unique entity identifier and System for Award Management (SAM.gov) Required Registrations

All organizations, whether based in the United States or in another country, must have a Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and an active registration in SAM.gov. A UEI is one of the data

elements mandated by Public Law 109-282, the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA), for all Federal awards. An applicant must maintain an active registration while it has a proposal under review by the Department and must continue to keep the registration active for the entire duration of the period of performance of any Federal award that results from this NOFO.

The 2 CFR 200 requires subrecipients to obtain a UEI. Please note the UEI for subrecipients is not required at the time of application but will be required before an award is processed and/or directed to a subrecipient.

Exemptions

An exemption from the UEI and sam.gov registration requirements may be permitted on a case-by-case basis. See <u>2 CFR 25.110</u> for a full list of exemptions.

Organizations requesting exemption from UEI or SAM.gov requirements must email the point of contact listed in the NOFO at least two weeks prior to the deadline in the NOFO providing a justification of their request. Approval for a SAM.gov exemption must come from the warranted Grants Officer before the application can be deemed eligible for review.

F. Application Review Information

1. Review Criteria

Each application will be evaluated and rated based on the evaluation criteria outlined below.

Quality and Feasibility of the Program Idea: The program idea is well developed, with detail about how program activities will be carried out. The proposal includes a reasonable implementation timeline.

Organizational Capacity and Record on Previous Grants: The organization has expertise in its stated field and has the internal controls in place to manage federal funds. This includes a financial management system and a bank account.

Program Planning/Ability to Achieve Objectives: Goals and objectives are clearly stated and program approach is likely to provide maximum impact in achieving the proposed results.

Budget: The budget justification is detailed. Costs are reasonable in relation to the proposed activities and anticipated results. The budget is realistic, accounting for all necessary expenses to achieve proposed activities.

Monitoring and evaluation plan: Applicant demonstrates it is able to measure program success against key indicators and provides milestones to indicate progress toward goals outlined in the proposal. The program includes output and outcome indicators and shows how and when those will be measured.

Sustainability: Program activities will continue to have positive impact after the end of the program.

2. Review and Selection Process

A review committee will evaluate all eligible applications.

3. Risk Review

i. Risk factors

Under the merit review as required by 2 CFR 200.206, prior to making a Federal Award the Department will review and consider the following risk factors:

- a. Financial stability
- b. Management systems and standards
- c. History of performance
- d. Audit reports and findings
- e. Ability to effectively implement requirements

G. Award Notices

The award or cooperative agreement will be written, signed, awarded, and administered by the Grants Officer. The award agreement is the authorizing document, and it will be provided to the recipient for review and counter-signature. The recipient may only start incurring project expenses beginning on the start date shown on the award document signed by the Grants Officer.

If a proposal is selected for funding, the Department of State has no obligation to provide any additional future funding. Renewal of an award to increase funding or extend the period of performance is at the discretion of the Department of State.

Issuance of this NOFO does not constitute an award commitment on the part of the U.S. government, nor does it commit the U.S. government to pay for costs incurred in the preparation and submission of proposals. Further, the U.S. government reserves the right to reject any or all proposals received.

2. Reporting

Reporting Requirements: Recipients will be required to submit financial reports and program reports. The award document will specify what reports are required and how often these reports must be submitted.

Foreign Assistance Data Review: As required by Congress, the Department of State must make progress in its efforts to improve tracking and reporting of foreign assistance data through the Foreign Assistance Data Review (FADR). The FADR requires tracking of foreign assistance activity data from budgeting, planning, and allocation through obligation and disbursement. Personnel and Fringe Benefits: Describe the wages, salaries, and benefits of temporary or permanent staff who will be working directly for the applicant on the program, and the percentage of their time that will be spent on the program.

Travel: Estimate the costs of travel and per diem for this program, for program staff, consultants or speakers, and participants/beneficiaries. If the program involves international travel, include a brief statement of justification for that travel.

Equipment: Describe any machinery, furniture, or other personal property that is required for the program, which has a useful life of more than one year (or a life longer than the duration of the program), and costs at least \$10,000 per unit.

Supplies: List and describe all the items and materials, including any computer devices, that are needed for the program. If an item costs more than \$10,000 per unit, then put it in the budget under Equipment.

Contractual: Describe goods and services that the applicant plans to acquire through a contract with a vendor. Also describe any sub-awards to non-profit partners that will help carry out the program activities.

"Cost Sharing" refers to contributions from the organization or other entities other than the U.S. Embassy. It also includes in-kind contributions such as volunteers' time and donated venues.

Alcoholic Beverages: Please note that award funds cannot be used for alcoholic beverages.
